Department of Student Voices in Education and Schools (DOVES)

Dorrigo High School DOVES Councillor, Myra, travelled to Sydney last week to be inducted into the DOVES Council and attend the AGM. Myra was an outstanding representative of her local school and community, as well as her wider DOVES directorate of Regional North and Northwest NSW. Myra attended media training at the NSW Department of Education Head Office followed by the official induction in the Chamber of the Legislative Assembly at NSW Parliament House, where Deputy Premier and Minister for Education, the Hon. Prue Car, presented her with her badge. Myra also had an opportunity to directly address Deputy Premier Car about educational issues that concerned her, including how government was addressing teacher shortages across the state. Myra spoke to both Deputy Premier Car and NSW Department of Education Secretary, Murat Dizdar, about her ambition to explore the teaching profession as a possible career pathway, drawing an enthusiastic response from them and prompting Secretary Dizdar to post the conversation on his social media feeds. Working together for student attendance and to maximise learning

We want to do all we can to be sure your child achieves their potential and enjoys being in school. We know that school is the best place to learn. By attending school every day your child will get the most out of their learning and improve their career and life options.

When your child is absent it is important you let the school know, including the reason why, on the day or the day before. This helps make sure we know where our students are and offer support for you and your family if needed.

If you are having trouble getting your child to school every day or on time, please talk to our school staff so we can work together, because every day counts.

Missing a day here or there may not seem like much, but absences add up and can negatively impact your child's learning and wellbeing. When your child misses one day per fortnight, that's 4 weeks of missed learning in one year. Over an entire school journey this adds up to 1 year of lost learning.





COVID-19 is still circulating in the community. We can all minimise the spread of COVID-19 and other respiratory diseases by maintaining good hygiene practices at home and school.

Please contact the school if your child needs to miss school for any reason, so we can plan continued support for your child's learning and wellbeing. The school has a supply of RAT's should you need them.

Dorrigo High School Staff Learning

Schools regularly discuss the concept of lifelong learning. Whilst we often focus, and should do so, on what students are learning in their classes, it is also important to acknowledge and share the learning of our school staff to foster transparency and conversations about the work that is being done, sometimes behind the scenes, to support our students.

This term, we have engaged in professional learning to support student behaviour and management processes and strategies. Our Verbal Interventions training helped staff to develop an effective framework for preventing, de-escalating, and safely responding to crisis behaviour that focuses on what's happening from two perspectives: the person in distress and the staff person. This training compliments our work last year on understanding behaviour and active engagement and upcoming training on understanding ADHD.

We have also been learning about 8 Ways Aboriginal Pedagogies. This is a pedagogy framework that allows teachers to include Aboriginal perspectives by using Aboriginal learning techniques. In this way, focus can remain on core curriculum content while embedding Aboriginal perspectives in every lesson, where we are teaching through culture, not about culture.

Our executive team have extended their learning with sessions on functional behaviour management and middle-leadership.

Finally, we wanted to share some insights from educational leadership expert Lyn Sharratt's book, Clarity. Our teachers are exploring evidence-based research as one of the tools we use to reflect on and improve our practice. Sharratt suggests that parents can ask their children five key questions about their learning to gain a deeper understanding of their experiences and progress. We would encourage you to try these questions out with your child, as they go beyond the typical "How was school today?" conversation:

What did you learn today?

How did you learn it?

How do you know you learned it?

How can you apply what you learned?

What further questions do you have about what you learned?

These questions can help your child reflect on their learning and develop a deeper understanding of the material. We believe that this kind of conversation can be invaluable to your child's academic success and overall well-being. More information about Clarity in a short four minute video.







NSW SCHOOL VACCINATION PROGRAM

In 2024 the following vaccines will be offered:

If your child is in Year 7 or Year 10 this year, you can now provide online consent for their routine school vaccinations.

In Year 7, students are offered free vaccines for diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis (dTpa) and human papillomavirus (HPV). In Year 10, students are offered the meningococcal ACWY vaccine.

Vaccination will only be provided at school if consent has been received.

How to provide consent:

- To complete online consent for your child's school vaccinations, visit: https://engage.health.nsw.gov.au/engage
- 2. Follow the steps to log in to your existing ServiceNSW account. This is the same account you may already use to renew your driver's licence. If you don't have a ServiceNSW to create one.
- 3. Update or confirm your personal details in ServiceNSW as required.
- 4. Complete the School Vaccination Consent Form for your child/ren. You will need to:
 - a) Enter your child's personal details
 - b) Provide the Medicare card details for you and your child
 - Read the linked <u>Parent Information Sheet and privacy statement</u>, <u>Translations available</u> in 27 languages
 - d) Provide consent

If you or your child do not have a Medicare card, consent can still be provided by requesting a paper-based consent form directly from your child's school,

The benefits of providing consent online:

- easily update your child's details
- receive SMS and/or email notifications when vaccinations are given
- · faster upload of vaccination records to the Australian Immunisation Register (AIR).
